First Grade

In reading we continue our focus on foundational skills such as rhyming, hearing beginning sounds in words and segmenting words into individual sounds. We are learning about story elements such as characters, setting and events and beginning to retell stories we have read and listened to. We are excited about writing our first narrative stories about things we have experienced.

In math we have completed our initial focus on addition facts through 10 and are now working on subtraction facts thru 10. First grade expectations are that children have memorized (are fluent) with addition and subtraction facts thru 10.

Pumpkin Palooza Update: On October 31st first grade will celebrate pumpkins. We will have centers that focus on pumpkins and fall. Parents if you are able to donate a small to medium sized pumpkin (one that your child can easily carry) we would greatly appreciate it.



Second Grade

HAPPY FALL Y'ALL! Going into November, we will be focusing more on our writing skills. As a second grader, students should be able to write complete sentences on assignments (that start with capital letters and end with punctuation). When working on homework with them, please practice this skill. In math, we are working with number patterns (skip counting, repeated addition, arrays, and even and odd numbers). In social studies, we are beginning to talk about rules, laws, and the roles that we all play in the community. PLEASE CONTINUE TO READ WITH YOUR CHILD FOR AT LEAST 20 MINUTES EVERY NIGHT!

Room 11 continues to work on building positive relationships and we are working on building positive problem solving skills. We have utilized The Zones of Regulation to identify our emotions, and we are developing the skill of moving ourselves through the zones and into a "Ready to Learn," space.

The students have greatly enjoyed our Fall Mystery Unit in Science. We've studied spiders and skeletons!

In reading, we are continuing to build on oral reading fluency and developing student comprehension of what they've read. You can help support this by reading at home each day!

Nurse Deighton Updates:

It has been a busy month! The Columbus Public Health Department has been here twice- Once to see the second and third graders for dental sealants and then again to give flu vaccines. 18 second grade students received Free Dental Sealants and the third grade students were seen for follow up. 41 students received flu vaccines.

I have seen all of the kindergarten students and over half of the third grade students to complete their health assessments. By the end of November all of the third grade students will have their health assessments done.

5th Grade has been very, very busy here at Maize Elementary! In Reading, we just finished the book "Because of Winn-Dixie" and began "Holes". Since we are really focusing on literature (fictional stories), it is a great read and the students seem to really be enjoying it so far. We are focusing on plot, character traits, inference and setting. A great way to help us out is to read with your student and ask them questions after the reading session is over! We are continuing to write about anything and everything! We have been doing "free-writes", research on countries, narratives and more in class. Next week we are doing a challenging writing assignment: taking research from nonfiction and turning it into a narrative! I'm sure the kids will enjoy it. Like previously mentioned, in Social Studies we are doing a research on countries and the students love it. They each got to pick their own country to research and study, and then we will be presenting the information. I'm looking forward to hearing what they all say.
