ATTENDANCE

Teachers take attendance every day promptly at 9am.

If your child will be absent from school for any reason, please send an email to our Attendance Inbox, or call the school, to explain the absence within 2 school days. Doctors may also use any of the following ways to report an absence or appointment:

Please see the Page 4 of the newsletter which outlines the provisions of House Bill 410 and its definitions of excessive absences and habitual truant. The state law does not differentiate between excused and unexcused absences, but rather how much time the student has missed in general. Review this information so you are not caught off guard. We are happy to answer any questions you may have.

Family To-Do Checklist

- ♦ **Complete your Parent Portal Annual Update** to update your address, telephone numbers, email addresses, and emergency contacts. Go to (https://www.ccsoh.us/domain/188) to complete your update.

Complete the forms in the Student Success Guide through the Parent Portal. This page also has important information about Student Success Cards and the upcoming Resource Fair that you won't want to miss.
- ♦ Schedule vaccinations and back to school health check ups.

 The Health Hub has important information about required vaccinations,
 School-Based Health Clinics, and current COVID protocols. Masks are recommended and welcome in our schools but not required. We have child-sized masks in stock whenever your student would like to wear one.
- Check your Parent Portal for Transportation Information. Bussing is routed according to your home address so make sure it is accurate! Make sure to check the Parent Portal frequently to be aware of bus route changes.
- Charge your chromebook and find your Student Success Card. You will need both of these things daily to have a successful school day!

ARRIVAL AND DISMISSAL

Arrival

- * General Education students in Grades PreK-5 may be dropped off at the front doors after 8:30am.
- * There is no parking in the bus lane. If parents need to come into the building, they must park in an open visitor space and walk in the front office.
- * Between 8:30 9:00am, Special Education Students are dropped off at the Second (East) Doors.
- * After 9am, ALL students must be walked into the Office to be signedin by a parent.

Dismissal

IMPORTANT

WE WILL ALWAYS PLACE STUDENTS ON THEIR ASSIGNED BUS UNLESS WE HAVE A WRITTEN NOTE FROM THEIR PARENT/GUARDIAN.

To notify staff about a change in transportation, you must send a written message to the office, or call the office, **before 2:45pm** on the day of the change.

EARLY PICK UP BEFORE 3:00pm

- * If you want to pick up your student from school early, you must come to the office before 3:00pm to sign them out.
- Parents arriving after 3:00pm will have to wait in the car pick-up line.

CAR-RIDER PICK-UP

- * Starts at approximately 3:20pm
- All students must be picked up by 3:40pm

Pre-School Students

- Released from the Gym Doors
- * Follow the directions provided to you during Orientation

Special Education Car Pick Up Students

* Released from the **East Doors** (Second Doors on Bus Lane). Pull up and an Aide will bring your child to you.

Kindergarten-Grade 5 Students

- * Released from Cafeteria Doors
- * Cars for K-5 students must line up in the alley between Duxberry and the Church, driving north (pointing toward Maynard) from 26th Ave. Parents must stay in their cars. A Duxberry Staff member will come out to your car and call for your child by walkie-talkie, one at a time, in order of the car line-up.



Transportation

Your child's bus route is created based on your home address.

Ohio Law (HB 410) recently changed how Columbus City Schools must track missed class time. No longer are absences tracked only by number of days your child has missed. Lost time is now counted by how many hours your child is out of class, both excused and unexcused.

EXCESSIVE ABSENCES

Students are expected to be in class the entire school day. Miss too much time - even if it's for doctor's appointments or family vacations - and the new law will now require the District to send families an official written notice that your child has "excessive absences."

You'll receive an excessive absences warning letter in the mail when your child is:

- · Absent 38 hours or more in one school month with or without legitimate excuse.
- Absent 65 hours or more in one school year with or without legitimate excuse.

We need your help to make sure that your student arrives on time and is regularly attending school through the end of the school day. Try to avoid appointments, trips, or delays that might keep your child out of class, even if it's only for a brief period of time. Lost time adds up.

HABITUAL TRUANT

If your child is excessively absent without a legitimate excuse, the new law labels him/her as "habitually truant." This happens after your child is:

- Absent 30 hours or more consecutive hours without legitimate excuse.
- Absent 42 or more hours in one school month without legitimate excuse.
- Absent 72 hours or more in one school year without legitimate excuse.

IN TEAM > Intervention Teams

When a student reaches this high level of unexcused missed class time, Ohio Law requires the District to set up an Intervention Team to determine why the child is habitually truant and what supports are needed to keep them in school.

You as the parent or guardian - or someone representing your family - must be part of this Intervention Team and contribute to developing and following the plan established.

Other supportive options may include counseling, parent education, mediation, and/or juvenile justice intervention programs. A complaint for truancy may be filed, if applicable.

Columbus City Schools looks forward to partnering together with students, families, and our community partners to identify and work through any attendance barriers.

Duxberry is a Title 1 School

Title I, Part A (Title I) of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESEA) provides financial assistance to local educational agencies (LEAs) and schools with high numbers or high percentages of children from low-income families to help ensure that all children meet challenging state academic standards. Federal funds are currently allocated through four statutory formulas that are based primarily on census poverty estimates and the cost of education in each state

This is important information to know because due to the Title 1 Federal dollars that are received, students at Duxberry are able to experience a greater level of support for academic intervention, a greater level of off-site extended learning opportunities, district and community sources supporting social and emotional needs, and the benefit of teachers who are exposed to rich professional development.
