### VISION & MISSION STATEMENTS

#### Vision

To ensure that each Columbus City School student has the opportunity to experience a quality mentoring relationship that will support them in the development of high school graduation and post-graduation goals and action plans.

#### Mission

To strengthen existing, develop new, and align all school-based mentorship programs to provide the additional socio-emotional support necessary to become a world-class model of public education that prepares members of our community to reach their full potential.

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## WHAT IS A MENTOR?

Mantras such as “It takes a village to raise a child” state that all persons need multiple teachers, supporters, and authority figures, in addition to parent/guardian(s), to assist in their personal and professional development. Serving as trusted sounding boards and guides, mentors are the people in our lives who will help us navigate our life paths. In sharing their wisdom with others, mentors provide the positive support and accountability necessary to significantly impact the future of a young person’s life for the better.

Despite the importance that mentors play in our lives, too many young people grow up without the guidance and support they need to help them along the path to success. The good news is that **YOU** can directly reverse this trend by volunteering to become a mentor who positively impacts young people's personal, academic, and professional growth by connecting them with social and economic opportunities—*The National Mentoring Partnership*.

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## CCS MENTORSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Columbus City Schools is recruiting community volunteers to serve as School Success Mentors for the 2017-18 academic year. The purpose of this program is to support 12<sup>th</sup> grade mentees to and through high school graduation. School Success Mentors will assist our students in the development and attainment of post-high school graduation goals. School Success Mentors commit to meet with their student for one hour each week at a time designated by the school location.

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## CCS MENTOR EXPECTATIONS:

### One Time Expectations

- **Pre-Match activities:**
  - BCI Background Check
  - Attend 3-hour training workshop
    - Complete and submit training evaluation form
  - Mentor Memorandum of Understanding document
  - Attend school site orientation
  - Participate in the matching process
- **Post-Match activities:**
  - Set/articulate boundaries for your mentee/mentor relationship
  - Introduce yourself to mentee parent/guardian(s) once matched
- **End of year activities:**
  - Attend end of the Mentoring Celebration in April/May
  - Complete and submit program evaluation form
  - Return as a mentor for the following year and recruit family, friends and colleagues!

### Weekly Expectations

- Meet with mentee at least once each week at the school site
- Complete and submit weekly mentor/mentee activity form
- Regularly check your student’s academic folder for updates
- Listen, be yourself, and practice non-judgmental, patient, and consistent communication



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- Be honest, trustworthy, encouraging; tell your mentee what they need to hear and provide constructive feedback
- Identify and build on mentees’ strengths
- Provide guidance and assistance for setting and achieving high school and post-graduation goals
- Develop and measure goals with benchmarks alongside your mentee based on the mentees interests
- Communicate with parents regarding progress and/or concerns at least once each month
- Support mentee communication with teachers and administration
- Reach out for help as needed

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## GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Columbus City School’s graduation requirements are comprised of three components:

1. Credit Attainment;
2. Completion of Internship Hours; and
3. State Test Passage.

This section briefly describes these requirements at a high-level and provides contact information should you require additional information.

### I. Credit Attainment:

In order for a Columbus City School student to graduate, they must earn 22 credit hours per the table below:

Number of Credits Required	Subject
1	Academic Elective ( <i>Science or Social Studies</i> )
3	Electives
4	English
1	Fine Arts
½	Health
1	Internship
4	Math
½	Physical Education
3	Science
3	Social Studies
1	Technology

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Students may earn credit in the following three ways:

1. Completing coursework;
2. Testing out of or demonstrating mastery of course content; or
3. Pursuing one or more educational options in accordance with the District's Credit Flexibility Program.

Credit may also be earned at an accredited postsecondary institution and/or via online work through the District’s Virtual Credit Advancement Program (VCAP).

## **VIRTUAL CREDIT ADVANCEMENT PROGRAM (VCAP):**

VCAP enables students to complete their high school diploma requirements online; choosing from a full complement of courses for enrichment, including courses in literature, history, science, mathematics, physical education and health. Whether students need to make up missed credits, repeat courses or balance school with other responsibilities, CCS-VCAP can be a great alternative. Eligible students must be enrolled in Columbus City Schools and be 14-21 years of age, but have not earned enough credits to graduate from high school. Students enrolled in our school-based programs are required to attend after-school programming a minimum of one evening per week.

This program benefits all students who participate by allowing them the opportunity to make up core and elective course credits or take core and/or elective courses for the first time that they could not fit in their original schedules. This benefit is in line with the district goal of providing the opportunity for every child to reach his/her full potential by preparing for college, securing a job, serving in the military or starting a business.

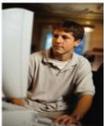

**Types of VCAP**

**School-Based:** Students who take VCAP at their home schools, either during the day or afterschool.

**Part-Time:** Students who take VCAP both at the Downtown High School and are enrolled in another program. Ex. Career Center, DeVry, CCCC.

**Full-Time:** Students taking VCAP exclusively at Downtown High School. To participate, students must also complete a minimum of 15 hours per week at the VCAP Lab.

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## 2. Internship Experience

All Columbus City Schools students are required to earn 120 internship hours of credit before they can graduate. The internship requirement provides students with opportunities to explore various career fields, gain a better understanding of different areas of the world of work, and participate in community service. Internship hours may be earned through volunteerism, career exploration, and/or by being employed in a paid/unpaid position. Students should have a variety of experiences with the suggested hours listed. A documentation form must be submitted for each activity.

Hours should be turned in to the Career and Community Resource Coordinator as soon as the activity is completed.

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### 3. State Test Passage

The third component that a Columbus City School student must complete to earn a high school diploma is State test passage unless otherwise specified in a student’s individualized education program as mandated by the State Board of Education.



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## EARNING YOUR HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA

As a student who entered grade 9 between **July 1, 2014**, and **June 30, 2015**, you have multiple pathways to earn a high school diploma so that you can move on to your next steps in education or a career.

- ▶ You must complete and earn the **Columbus City Schools'** district minimum of 22 credits in specific subjects. Detailed requirements are on the Academic Graduation Planner available at your school or online. See your school counselor for planning and support.
- ▶ You must demonstrate what you have learned. There are three pathways in Ohio law.

### 1. Ohio's State Tests

Earn 18 out of 35 points on seven end-of-course state tests. You can earn up to five points on each test. You need a minimum of four points in math, four points in English language arts and six points across science and social studies.

### 2. Industry-recognized credential and score on workforce readiness test

Earn an industry-recognized credential or a group of credentials totaling 12 points and earn the required score on the WorkKeys test. Ohio pays for you to take the test one time. **Columbus City Schools** offers the **Senior Only** program through which you can earn credentials in one school year.

### 3. College and career readiness tests

**Columbus City Schools** encourages students to earn remediation-free scores\* in math and English language arts on the ACT. You can take a one-time statewide spring test in grade 11 for free.

\*Ohio's university presidents set these scores, which are subject to change..

If you do not meet any of the above three pathways, Ohio law provides you two additional options to earn a high school diploma. The reverse side of this fact sheet explains the options.

## DISTRICT/SCHOOL BUILDING RESOURCES

There may come a point in your mentorship experience when you will need to seek out additional school and/or community resources. **Do not hesitate** to reach out to your site coordinator should you encounter information or issues that you do not feel comfortable handling on your own. If there are issues that indicate your mentee is in harm’s way and you cannot reach your site coordinator,, please contact a member of the OSMI Team.

Each school building has the following resources available to you:

- **Guidance Counselor:** social and/or emotional issues.
- **I Know I Can Advisor:** college application, FAFSA, ACT, SAT registration and/or information.
- **Internship Coordinator:** question regarding internship hours and opportunities.
- **School Nurse:** medical issues or concerns.
- **Site Coordinator:** The building person in charge of administering the SSM program at your student’s school location.
- **Social Worker:** family / community resources.
- **VCAP Coordinator:** questions regarding your mentee’s progress or performance.

## STUDENT ACADEMIC FOLDERS

For mentors working with students who are seniors, an academic folder will be maintained at the student’s school to keep the mentor abreast of their student’s progress toward the graduation requirements.

As a CCS employee, you have flexibility as to when you meet with your students. That said, if you meet with your student during the time designated by the school building, you will find your student’s folder in the mentor/mentee meeting space. If you meet with your student outside of the designated meeting time, work with the school’s mentorship site coordinator to identify where you can locate the folder when you are in the building.
