## **DIGITAL TEXTS**

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1. As part of the online portion of the adopted Pearson texts, you have access to leveled readers. They are part of the products you can load onto your online **SuccessNet** dashboard. <u>HERE</u> are the directions for accessing them. Feel free to register as a new user if you do not recall your old login info.

2. The CCS libraries have a subscription to online texts through **Follett**. See your librarian for information about titles and accessing them.

3. **Open ebooks** (http://www.openebooks.net/getstarted.html)/First Book is a free site that teachers and schools can register to use. Your school may already be signed up through your librarian. If you are not, you can follow the steps below to register. If your entire school plans to use the site/app, please only do one request for the entire school and not have separate signups by each teacher--that is the request made to us by First Book.

-SIGN UP – Sign up with First Book for free.

-REQUEST YOUR FREE CODES — Visit the First Book Marketplace and request as many free access codes as you need for the number of children you serve. Each child you serve should receive their own unique code. There are different codes for different age ranges, but you may request as many codes as you need for any age range. Note: You will not be asked to enter the names or any personal identifying information about the children. Read about the privacy policy here.

**-DOWNLOAD AND ACCESS** — You will then receive an email with the requested access codes and download instructions for the app.

4. **CommonLit** <u>https://commonlit.org</u> is an online literacy tool is full of reading passages that has several full length pieces. It has poetry and prose, fiction and nonfiction. It has a guided reading mode for struggling readers. Kingswood will preload your classes. Log in through Clever.

5. Sites such as **NewsELA** <u>https://newsela.com</u> and **ReadWorks** <u>http://readworks.org</u> have shorter readings.

6. **Play Shakespeare** <u>https://www.playshakespeare.com</u> has online full texts of Shakespeare's works. Also, know that all of the No Fear versions of Shakespeare's plays are also free online at <u>http://nfs.sparknotes.com</u>. These have a modern translation next to the original texts.

11. **Read Print** <u>http://www.readprint.com</u> is a free online library where you can find literally thousands of free books to read for free online, from classics to science fiction to Shakespeare. Registration is free and gives the user a virtual library card for a wide variety of books, as well as the ability to keep track of what you've read and what you'd like to read, discover new books you might like, and join online book clubs to discuss great works of literature.

12. **ManyBooks** <u>http://manybooks.net</u> has free books in a variety of download formats.There are hundreds of books available here, in all sorts of interesting genres, and all of them are completely free.
