INTRODUCTION: ABTATO (6-10 Sentences)

Grab <u>Attention</u>,

Give <u>Background</u> Info (about author(s), work(s), time period, etc.),

Give <u>*Title*</u> of work(s) you will be writing about,

Give <u>Author</u> of work(s) you will be writing about,

State <u>Thesis</u>, and

Give an <u>Organizational pattern/preview for your essay</u>.

-You may skip Title, Author and just use ABTO if the writing is not about a text.

-On Standardized Tests, you may skip Attention, Background if low on time.

BODY PARAGRAPHS: PETEs (10-15 Sentences Each)

Make your <u>Point</u>, <u>Explain</u> it fully, Back it up with <u>Text</u> or example, and <u>E</u>laborate on how the text fits your Point and supports Thesis.

(Each body paragraph should have a PETE, so a five-paragraph essay will have three PETEs. The P, E, T, and E in each body paragraph can happen out of order, be blended, and/or be repeated. Use transitions to show relationships throughout.)

CONCLUSION: TOO (5-10 Sentences)

Restate Thesis,

Give Overview of your main points, and

Give <u>Outlook</u>--tie to a whole or give your own opinion without "I think/believe."

TRANSITIONS: These can be used between the intro and body, between body points/paragraphs, and between the body and conclusion.
