You Tube† – Watch, upload and share videos

- Create channels and playlists to share with students



News – Search thousands of news stories

- Find current articles listed under categories



Google Photos† – All your photos on all your devices, organized and easy to share

- Create albums, others can view, add photos and text



Panoramio† – Explore and share photos of the world

- Search specific places and view cultural photos from there



Earth† – Explore the world from your computer

- Zoom in on specific parts of the world (students' homes)



Gmail – Fast, searchable email with less spam

- Create student folders in your email to keep emailed student work



Drive – Create, share and keep all your stuff in one place

- Share files and folders with staff and students



Docs – Open, edit, and create documents

- Like “Word”, but people can type on the document at the same time, they share it with you, and you can add notes to it



Sheets – Open, edit, and create spreadsheets

- Like “Excel”, people can work on the sheet at the same time



Forms† – Build free surveys, quizzes, add images

- Gathered data is organized into charts, graphs & sheets



Slides† – Open, edit, and create presentations

- Like “Power Point”, can work on the presentation at the same time



Drawings – Create diagrams and flow charts

- Import charts and images too



Translate† - Translate text, web pages, and files...over 50 languages

- Put it on your phone to communicate with Newcomers
- Not recommended for whole-document translating



Voice† – Get a free phone # and voicemail to give to students

- Students read out loud, answer ?’s. etc. Voicemail goes to your email



Calendar –Organize your schedule and share events with friends

- Use a shared calendar for homework, quizzes, activities, etc



Sites – Create websites and secure group wikis

- Create your class website to share your calendar, You Tube channel, Drive folders, Google Photo Albums, your Blogger and more



Keep† – Save what’s on your mind

- Create, save and share post-its, to do and check-lists, add pictures



Google+ - Real-life sharing, rethought for the web (like Facebook)

- Create class groups to facilitate sharing posts, albums and more



Groups – Create mailing lists and discussion groups

- Create a discussion group with a class



Blogger – Share your life online with a blog - it's quick, easy and free

- Share your blog, others can post comments



Hangouts – Video, Phone conference (Like Facetime/Skype)

- Have an on-line guest speaker or meet with an off-site class; students can collaborate for a project outside of school

† = Great for Pre-functional level students as well!
