Requirements: Target Pre-K—12th grade students who are new readers; Target below grade level readers; Assist readers with learning disabilities

Eligibility: Local nonprofit organizations, schools and libraries Award Amount: Maximum is \$4,000

Big Yellow School Bus Program Ohio Arts 🔅

Organization: Ohio Arts Council Grant Amount: up to \$500 for transportation Deadline: 12/31/2020 Guidelines link: Click here to view guidelines

Description: The Big Yellow School Bus program provides support for the travel costs associated with arts-related school field trips. Private and public schools (pre-kindergarten through secondary) and associations for home-schooled students may apply for up to \$500 for transportation costs associated with educational field trips to galleries, museums, festivals, exhibitions and performances. Applications are being accepted and are due no later than eights weeks prior to the date of the proposed event. Grants will be awarded on a rolling basis for as long as funds are available.

All grants applications must go through the CCS grant endorsement process and be approved by the Grant Review Committee prior to submission.

News to Use - FERPA training usually applies to school personnel who have contact with education records, such as administrators, staff, and classroom teachers. Students also benefit from digital literacy training with an emphasis on internet safety and privacy. Experts recognize that many FERPA violations occur due to lack of knowledge, which is why training is essential, even for youths. As the digital landscape continues to expand in K-12 education, so will the legal implications of technology misuse among children as they become more dependent on electronic devices.

The Consortium for School Networking says schools must educate students on appropriate behaviors in online communications and to apply best practices to protect and control their personal information. School district personnel can determine the most appropriate methods—be it courses, assemblies, emails, or guides—to teach students the necessary skills and dispositions to safeguard their digital footprint.



Do's and Don'ts - Family Engagement

Do engage all families, including parents of high-performing students - ESSA does not make exceptions for family engagement based on student achievement. All Title I families must be engaged by their schools and local educational agencies.

Don't do family engagement in isolation.

Do provide regular meetings at parents' request.

Don't forget to be flexible in scheduling school meetings. The law emphasizes flexibility in scheduling a school's annual meeting on family engagement and in arranging training for families to increase their capacity.

Do fund child care for family engagement - Child care and transportation is an allowable costs for family engagement.

Don't share individualized student data and achievement - should be generic in nature of processes and procedures.
