GRANT OPPORTUNITIES

P. Buckley Moss Foundation for Children's Education Grants

What It Is: For projects within schools serving all children that integrates the arts into educational programs. The purpose for this grant is to aid and support teachers who wish to establish or maintain an effective learning tool using the visual arts within the school day.

Award: Up to \$1,000 Deadline: September 30, 2021

American Association of Educators Classroom Grant

This educational grant provides up to \$500 for teachers to purchase classroom resources such as books, curriculum, or audiovisual equipment.

Who's Eligible: Full-time educators who have not received an AAE grant in the past two years.

How to Apply: Send in an informational form and grant proposal by the Autumn (October 1) or Spring (March 1) deadline.

Classroom Technology Grants

Amount: \$250-\$5,000

Description: Educators of America offers these grants to help get updated technology to teachers and classrooms. Funding can be used for interactive whiteboards, laptops, or tablets for student use and more.

Who Qualifies: K-12 teachers

Deadline: Rolling. Applications are reviewed four times a year in January, April, July, and October.

NEA Foundation Learning & Leadership Grants

Sponsor: National Education Association Foundation
Award: \$2,000 or \$5,000
Number of Awards: Not specified
Application Deadline: Feb. 1, June 1 and Oct. 15 of each year.

THE LAWRENCE FOUNDATION

Amount: Grants typically range between \$5,000 - \$10,000.

Description: The foundation makes grants to US based qualified charitable organizations.

Nonprofit organizations that qualify for public charity status under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code or public schools and libraries are eligible for contributions or grants. We are okay if a portion of any grant that we award is used for reasonable indirect costs.

No geographical restrictions.

Deadline: Our foundation has two grant cycles: June and December. A completed application must be submitted online, using the Common Grant Application, by midnight (23:59:59) Central Time (CT) on either **April 30** or **October 31**

Money from the Arts Fund can be used toward art supplies, musical instruments, theater costumes, and more.

Parent and Family Engagement -

General Obligations

1, Who is a parent for the purposes of Title I, Part A?

In addition to a natural parent, the term "parent" includes a legal guardian or other person standing "in loco parentis" (such as a grandparent or stepparent with who the child lives, or a person who is legally responsible for the child's welfare.

2. Must schools involve parents in the continuous improvement of Title I, Part A program?

Yes. Schools must involve parents in an organized, ongoing, and timely way—in the planning, review, and improvement of Title I programs, including the planning, review and improvement of the school parent and family engagement policy, and the joint development of any school wide program plan.

- 3. What information about Title I should be disseminated to parents?
 - A description and explanation of the curriculum in use at the school
 - The forms of academic assessment used to measure student progress.
 - The proficiency levels students are expected to meet.

In addition, upon the request of parents, schools must provide opportunities for regular meetings for parents to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions about the education of their children. The school must respond to any such suggestions as soon as practicably possible.

4. Is volunteering in a child's classroom considered a way to help parents share the responsibility for student learning?

Yes. Parent Involvement: Title I, Part A Non Regulatory Guidance from 2004 encourages parent volunteering in classrooms as an effective vehicle for shared responsibility for student academic achievement.

Should school staff receive training related to

parent and family engagement?

Yes. Section 1116(e)(3) says schools must "educate teachers, specialized instructional support personnel, principals, other school leaders, and other staff with the assistance of parents in the value and utility contributions of parents, and in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, implement and coordinate parent programs, and build ties between parents and schools."
