

There are several programs available for students to pursue advanced coursework and potentially earn college credit. Although the list below is not exhaustive, the four key options most often utilized by Columbus City Schools' students are as follows:

- Advanced Placement (AP) This is a collection of advanced courses taken at the high school. Meant to emulate freshmen college level courses, these allow students to work on university coursework in a supportive high school environment. College credit is not guaranteed and requires a score of 3, 4 or 5 (depending upon the university) on the AP exam in May. There is also no impact on a college transcript if credit is not awarded.
- International Baccalaureate (IB) This is a collection of advanced courses taken at the high school either as individual courses or as part of a comprehensive diploma program. Meant to emulate college level courses based on international standards, these allow students to work on university coursework in a supportive high school environment. College credit is not guaranteed and requires passage of an IB exam administered in May. There is also no impact on a college transcript if credit is not awarded.
- **College Credit Plus (CCP)** This program opens, with some limitations, the catalog of university courses to students who meet college entrance requirements as early as 7th grade. Courses and scheduling are dependent on the university. Credit is not guaranteed, but awarded based on the student earning a passing grade. There is an impact as the student's grade becomes a permanent part of their college transcript.
- **Career Center Pathways** This program is based on a Pathway or area of specialization chosen by the student. The program is open to 11th and 12th graders who are accepted into their chosen program. Students can take courses in their specialization at 1/2 day programs at Ft. Hayes and a full-day program at Columbus Downtown High School. Students complete their academic courses at their chosen high school for 1/2 day programs. There is an impact on the college transcript if students enroll in College Credit Plus courses. Credit only is given to students taking the articulated credit courses or CTAG (Credit Technical Assurance Guide) courses.

We are often asked if one is better than the other. It depends on the purpose of taking the advanced courses and the goal of the individual student. If the goal is to build transcript strength for acceptance into a highly competitive university, Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate may be the way to go. If the goal is to get through an associate's degree or 4-year degree at a local university quickly, College Credit Plus may be the best option. If the end goal is to begin arranging for career placement out of high school in addition to becoming college and career ready, then the Career Center pathways may be the best option. Also, some courses may be more rigorous in different settings. Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate courses involve a lot of writing, so humanities courses tend to be very rich. However, College Credit Plus is helpful for students who need mathematics courses beyond calculus or specialized science courses or for students with very explicit course interests. Finally, the best option may not be one over another. It may be to mix and match courses from multiple options as the schedule allows to find the right fit for each individual student.
