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Welcome to Your Whetstone High School...

Whetstone High School is a neighborhood school providing a traditional high school experience in the heart of the Clintonville community. Whetstone has the broadest base of neighborhood and community involvement of any school in Columbus City.

We offer:

- Strong academic courses, taught by experienced teachers,
- Early college options, including a dual-credit program with Columbus State Community College, AP courses and post-secondary enrollment options across a number of local universities and colleges,
- Foreign language programs that include Spanish, French, travel and the unique option of American Sign Language,
- Vibrant visual and performing arts programs,
- Champion athletic teams,
- A wide variety of clubs,
- Service opportunities to improve our community and our world.

At Whetstone we **Brave the Future**, ensuring our students are ready for college, work experiences, the military, or whatever they dream. Our mantra is: Braves Bring Responsibility, Ambition, Values, Energy and Service (BRAVES). At Whetstone High School we work everyday to grow, learn and be better— for our futures, for our families, for our community, and for our world.

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CUTTING EDGE ACADEMICS

An Overview

Whetstone is a comprehensive high school with college prep emphasis. The curriculum at Whetstone High School is diverse, and comprehensive with course offerings ranging from those needed to earn a Columbus City Schools Diploma of Distinction or Certificate of Specialization, English Language Learner courses, and a range of special education courses.

- Many Advanced Placement classes are offered along with a wide variety of dual-enrollment College Credit Plus opportunities, located both at Whetstone and through our school at area college campuses.
- The broad programming at Whetstone, including courses such as American Sign Language, allows each student to reach their individual level of success.
- Whetstone is the only high school in the district that offers a Resource Room program for the Visually Impaired.

Each year, approximately 60% of Whetstone HS graduates seek additional formal education at a four-year college or university, a two-year institution, or a technical program. Approximately 50% of graduates acquire the CCS Certificate of College Preparation and 30% receive the Certificate of Specialization.

EARLY COLLEGE: BRAVE THE FUTURE NOW

At Whetstone High School, students can earn college credit at no cost to their families. Over 90 Whetstone students take college credits each year. The value of all courses combined is nearly \$400,000 annually.

All college courses fall under the State's **College Credit Plus (CCP)** program umbrella, which allows qualifying students to take college courses at area colleges/universities on the college or university campus or through embedded courses at Whetstone. CCP courses provide students dual credit (both high school and college credits). All CCP students must complete the Intent to Participate form by April 1 the year prior to taking College Credit Plus courses. Each university has specific application and testing requirements that students are responsible for meeting (deadlines are typically in the Spring of the prior school year). Students can take college courses in combination with high school courses, or exclusively through the college (should their course plan and the college allow). CCP offers great flexibility for our students who are ready for the extra challenge of college coursework!

Whetstone and Columbus City Schools also provide the following CCP Opportunities:

Credits Count Program in Computer Science at Whetstone: The Credits Count program with Columbus State Community College offers a unique opportunity for Whetstone students to complete college coursework. The dual enrollment program, made possible by a gift from American Electric Power, allows students to graduate high school with up to 12 college credits in computer science.

Embedded Columbus State Courses at Whetstone: Columbus State also offers College Credit Plus courses held at Whetstone in Psychology, Sociology, U.S. History, and American Sign Language. (Students must meet CCP and CSCC requirements to participate)

Seniors-to-Sophomores: The Columbus City Schools Seniors-to-Sophomores Program allows high school seniors to take college courses full time as part of a supportive, structured cohort program. It is a cost-free option that may qualify students to have sophomore status in college after they graduate from high school. Locations include The Ohio State University, Otterbein, Columbus State Community College, Capital, and Franklin. (Note: this is NOT the only way for students to take college coursework full time, Seniors to Sophomores provides the supportive programming and more structured scheduling for students who may need it.)

Junior Jumpstart: A half-day version of the Seniors to Sophomores program that allows students to take a couple of specific Columbus State Community College courses in a structured cohort program as a Junior in high school. It does require an additional application.

In addition to the CCP program, Whetstone offers **Advanced Placement (AP)** courses in English Literature and Composition, Language and Composition, Biology, Chemistry, Calculus AB, American Government, Environmental Science, and Human Geography.

Whetstone also has the advantage and support of **I Know I Can**, a nonprofit dedicated to helping students reach and succeed in college. I Know I Can offers Blue Print College workshops to help students and families prepare for college admissions. I Know I Can also provides a full time college advisor dedicated to Whetstone students.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE PROGRAMS

Whetstone High School offers three options for foreign language study:

- Spanish
 - With 329 million native speakers, Spanish ranks second worldwide in terms of how many people speak it as their first language.
 - Whetstone offers Spanish 1 to 5.
- French
 - Around the world 75 million people speak French, which is the 14th most commonly spoken language.
 - Whetstone offers French 1 to 5.
- American Sign Language
 - There are an estimated 250,000 to 500,000 speakers of American Sign Language. A significant portion of Americans (17%) experience some hearing loss, and learning American Sign Language offers our students many benefits.
 - In addition to being able to communicate with the deaf community, which is large and vibrant in Columbus, Ohio, our students can explore and understand this widely spoken language.
 - Our students have opportunities to sign in front of groups in our school and larger community.
 - Whetstone offers American Sign Language 1 to 3, as well as advanced courses through College Credit Plus in conjunction with Columbus State Community College.

English Language Learners

Whetstone High School offers cutting-edge services for qualifying English language learners no matter the needs of the student, ranging from beginner to advanced. We have a sheltered academic unit with teachers trained and licensed in Language Acquisition, as well as Social Studies, English Language Arts, Math and Science to assure that all students' needs are met. Whetstone has bilingual instructional assistants and offers in-house translation and parent communication services in Spanish. If you are looking for a full, comprehensive high school that will also provide services for all your language learning needs, look no further than Whetstone High School.

Options to Travel Abroad

Students who study French and Spanish have an opportunity to travel abroad during summer break. In 2012, French students travelled to France for ten days to see the Riviera, the Loire Valley, and Paris. In 2013, students visited Costa Rica. In 2015, students visited Barcelona, Spain. In the summer of 2016, students visited Paris, France, and in 2017 Whetstone students explored Peru. Costa Rica was the travel destination for 2019.

Language courses are offered at introductory and advanced levels, with College Credit Plus options for college credit.

HEADLINE: CAREER CENTER OPPORTUNITIES

Whetstone students have the opportunity to attend one of two Career Centers for part of the school day. Sophomores visit both Columbus Downtown High School and Fort Hayes Career Center. Interested students can apply to attend a career center during their junior and senior years. Whetstone's Career Center liaison works with students once they are admitted.

The career centers prepare students for in-demand careers in high-growth fields including construction, health care, media arts, performing arts, visual arts, transportation, cosmetology, information technology, culinary arts, public safety, education, and manufacturing.

NAVIGATING HIGH SCHOOL: SCHOOL COUNSELORS

Whetstone Counselors are here to help you navigate academics and other aspects of high school. You will be assigned a counselor according to your last name so that you have that same counselor throughout your years at Whetstone.

School Counselors are licensed by the Ohio Department of Education in School Counseling, have completed a Master's Degree in Counseling, adhere to the ASCA code of ethics, and are equipped to promote student success, wellness, and growth in three domains: Academics, Emotional/Social Wellness/Mental Health, and College/Career Readiness. In alignment with the ASCA National Model for a Comprehensive School Counseling Program, counselors work with students, their families, school faculty and staff, community members and organizations, and other stakeholders to serve all students and expand access to opportunities.

A message from the WHS counseling team: We meet with our students in one-on-one (individual counseling), small group, and classroom settings, and are available for consultation and collaboration with families, community members/organizations, and school staff. We want to see all students to achieve their full potential and to set them on a trajectory for life-long success by empowering students to overcome barriers to their success, fostering a sense of belonging and value, and equipping students to reach and expand their potential, ready to lead a full and engaged life in a diverse world.



WHS is home to a multitude of diverse groups representing nations, religions, classes and cultures from all over the world. Growing up, I battled many disparities, one being neighborhood violence. WHS served as a place of refuge for its diverse students. Several of my teachers/coaches mentored and guided me through high school. WHETSTONE ATHLETICS

While Whetstone consistently boasts numerous athletic championships, winning isn't the whole equation. At Whetstone every athletic team is seen as an extension of the community and an opportunity to build character and camaraderie.

A study by the Women's Sport Foundation (1989) showed that high school students who participate in athletics do better academically, are more involved and stay more involved in their communities after graduation. The U.S. Department of Education's High School and Beyond Study also shows that student athletes are much more likely to stay in school. And, research conducted by Skip Dane of Hardiness Research Center (1991), shows that the benefits of sports participation are strong for both girls and boys, grades are higher for athletes and drug use by student athletes is significantly lower than among non-athletes.

WE BRAVE THE FUTURE THROUGH SERVICE

While Whetstone students are required to complete **120 hours of community service** to graduate, many of our students go above and beyond to make the world a better place.

Opportunities to help the school community are offered to all students. From participating in grounds cleanup to helping put on drama productions, or helping other students academically, students are encouraged to participate in making Whetstone a great place to go to school.

Students are also encouraged to connect with their communities, volunteering at nonprofits in their neighborhoods, painting area business windows with the art club or supporting our neighborhood elementary schools through volunteering or giving performances of music and theatre.

Additionally, our students work to make the world a better place through projects in their humanities, science and other classes connected to world issues, through their own personal commitments.

In the spring of 2020, the American Sign Language class connected with a local elderly deaf retirement community where they are using the skills learned in class to communicate and bring joy to their residents. Recently, a group of students started the Feminist Club with the help of a staff member. The club is focused on education, as well as social justice work. Also, the Key Club organizes a project to provide food to families in Lesotho, an impoverished country in Southern Africa.

It's through activities such as these, as well as many others, that the students of Whetstone High School not only learn valuable life skills but also give back to the community they live in to make the world a better place.

BROAD PARENT AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT

The Whetstone High School PTA makes a difference in the Braves Community!

Athletic Boosters

The Whetstone High School Athletic Boosters encourage and support the advancement of student-athletes at Whetstone. We are a very active parent organization that works with the coaches to promote the success of our teams both on and off the field of competition. For example, athletes who demonstrate achievement in the classroom are recognized in the fall and spring, and seniors are eligible for Athletic Boosters' scholarships.

Columbus City Schools is one of the few districts in central Ohio that does not require participation fees for sports (known as "pay to play"). However there are still expenses that our teams and athletes incur to compete. The Athletic Boosters support for the student-athletes at Whetstone includes helping with team camp and tournament fees, purchasing sports equipment, and financing special projects such as weight room renovations, new dugouts and fencing for the softball field, stadium locker room upgrades, and press box remodeling, to name a few. With twenty-two teams and more than 500 student-athletes, (about 50% of the student body), the Athletic Boosters keep busy with requests for a variety of assistance.

The number and diversity of athletic opportunities make Whetstone unique – students have a variety of options in choosing a sport to play, and are able to try sports that they may not have had a chance to play before. With our strong Junior Varsity programs, incoming freshman gain playing experience right away.

There's no membership fee to join the Athletic Boosters – just send us an email at whetstone.athleticboosters@gmail.com to let us know you're interested in becoming a Booster. Just a few hours of your time each year makes a big difference for our teams. We support our teams with the community-wide fundraising Booster Drive in the fall, as well as concession sales during each season. These fundraisers are only successful with the help of our dedicated volunteers. Volunteering is also a great way to meet other Whetstone parents.

STAY OR GO?

City-dwelling parents are refusing to join the exodus of young families to suburban school districts, choosing instead to stay in the homes and neighborhoods they love and create the schools they want for their children.

Lawyer Gus Dahlberg and his wife moved to Clintonville in 2003 while she was pregnant. The topic of schools came up often, and he kept hearing the same thing from his neighbors: Public schools in Clintonville are OK, but you may want to look at private schools. And be careful when you get to middle school.

Meanwhile, Dahlberg and his family became close with other families in the community, many of whom, like Dahlberg, eventually decided to send their kids to public elementary schools. As parents mingled at the

bus stop on weekday mornings, they began to discuss what to do about their kids' education beyond the elementary level. "They all said, 'We like where we're at,'" Dahlberg says. "We like the schools we're in. We like the people we're with. Why should we have to leave Clintonville? What's wrong with these schools that people are so afraid of?"

Nobody had answers, but one parent, Laura Kraus, had recently read a book titled "How to Walk to School: Blueprint for a Neighborhood School Renaissance," which detailed how author and parent

Jacqueline Edelberg partnered with other moms, artists, local businesses and co-author and school principal Susan Kurland to transform Chicago's rundown, failing Nettelhorst Elementary into a beautiful, successful urban school. Coincidentally, Edelberg was visiting Columbus on a speaking tour the summer of 2011, so Kraus reached out to her to ask if some Clintonville parents could pick her brain. Edelberg agreed, and that conversation over a bottle of wine around a kitchen table became the catalyst for the formation of a parent-led grassroots group called Clintonville Go Public.

"It went from a promotional effort to: Let's dig in and make a community effort to invest in the school system and get people to realize they don't have to run from Clintonville when the kids turn 10," Dahlberg says.

"Lots of people who are in a city look at [the suburbs] and say, 'You know, I actually don't want to spend the rest of my life eating at an Olive Garden,' " Edelberg tells me over the phone. "I like my house. I have friends. My kids have friends. I have places I eat that I think are yummy. The only reason people left my neighborhood was because of the schools. But it seems silly to leave all that behind. So the question is: How do you create a threshold so that enough like-minded people all decide they'll jump with you? How many kids would you need to make it feel like you weren't a lunatic?"

Like Dahlberg, Merion Village resident Ken Flower felt a bond with his community. "People love German Village and Merion Village. They're proud of the neighborhood," Flower says. "But one of our consistent weak spots is schools. You hear of a lot of young professionals moving in, getting married, having kids, and then kids reach age 3 or 4 and they move out of the neighborhood."

Flower—a pastor, Bexley Public Library employee and father of two (with another on the way)—didn't want to leave, and he knew others probably felt the same way. Shiloh Todorov,

director of the German Village Society, connected him with other neighborhood parents who were thinking critically about the school issue, and they all met with the society's Long Range Planning Committee in summer 2012. As a result of that meeting, Flower and the other parents created and distributed a short, simple survey to better understand the community's thoughts on their neighborhood schools. Particularly telling were responses to the question, "Do you plan on moving when your kids reach school age?" About 80 percent of respondents said, "Yes," and for most of them, the primary reason was poor school options.

Pretty soon, Flower and a group of parents officially organized, meeting every other week and naming their group Southside STAY (Standing Together to Advance Youth). Flower and others had also read "How to Walk to School," and they knew about Clintonville Go Public. "They were about a year ahead in terms of organizing," Flower says. "We invited Gus and Laura to one of our first meetings to tell their story. They were a huge help."

Both STAY and Go Public emphasize the importance of neighborhood schools and the "feeder pattern," which Columbus City Schools formally implemented about six years ago. It's a streamlined way for students to move from building to building. Previously, students might have attended a nearby elementary school and then graduated to a middle school on the other side of town. Now, with some exceptions due to school closings and the school-choice lottery system, students who start kindergarten together remain together all the way through high school.

"You get that in Upper Arlington, which has a tremendous sense of community," Dahlberg says. "There's a backbone, and everything feeds off of that. We really wanted that here. It's here already, and it would exist without us, but it needs nurturing. It needs promotion."

The theory goes like this: If a group of kids and their highly engaged parents stay together for the long haul, they'll see the same positive results every year, and those results will spill over to other students. "It's a rising-tide-floats-

BLUEPRINT FOR RENEWAL

A simple, bold idea led parents in one Chicago neighborhood to remake an elementary school—and detail the toil and triumph in a book.

Jacqueline Edelberg and Susan Kurland delve into the Nettelhorst Elementary story in more detail in their book, "How to Walk to School: Blueprint for a Neighborhood School Renaissance." The approach is as simple as it is audacious: They made a list of needed improvements at Nettelhorst, convinced themselves they could make most of those improvements in nine months and then set out to transform the school.

They worked from the outside in, first removing any signs containing the word "no," then lifting the shades on the windows and painting

the doors bright colors. "We knew if it looked like a halfway house, no one would walk in the door—assuming they could find the front door," Edelberg told me during a phone interview from her home in Chicago.

The parent volunteers had no budget, so they asked local stores to donate paint and recruited contractors to adopt rooms to complete. Nettelhorst moms befriended designers and artists who refreshed the interior. More than \$2 million worth of goods and services were donated over a period of two years. "You have to get the whole community to wrap its arms around the school," Edelberg says.

Edelberg says tracking down new school supplies, books and other services was easy. "You just have to ask," she says. The hardest part was changing the minds of neighborhood parents who had never considered sending their children to a school like Nettelhorst. "Changing the community's perception took up most of our energy," she says.

all-boats theory,” Dahlberg says. “If you have that base in the system, it will improve everyone’s lot. That’s an essential theory in all of this.”

Edelberg says her experience with Nettelhorst in Chicago proves the theory. After she and a group of moms persuaded others to send their kids to Nettelhorst, over time, everyone’s test scores improved, not just the new kids’.

Go Public and STAY aren’t trying to replace parent-teacher associations. They say part of their job is to ensure each school in the neighborhood has a thriving PTA. And while most school-reform groups tend to focus on hot-button issues like curriculum, standardized testing, No Child Left Behind and other various metrics, Go Public and STAY try not to get involved in those issues, which is harder than it sounds. Get a group of involved parents together who are passionate about the education of their own children and the children in the community, and those divisive issues will undoubtedly arise. “It’s easy to divert the conversation by talking about curriculum, and then it’s about the whole

school system and what’s happening at the state or district level,” Dahlberg says. “And that’s not what our focus is.”

Columbus City Schools spokesman Jeff Warner says the mission of Go Public and STAY doesn’t conflict with the district’s philosophy, even though school choice plays an important role in the district’s offerings. “We want the same things,” Warner says. “We want the neighborhood schools to not be questioned in the least. The questions that these community organizations bring to the table help us think about things differently. They push us to be better. Their level of commitment to neighborhood schools is a breath of fresh air.”

While Nettelhorst experienced a drastic turnaround in the span of nine months, the efforts of Go Public and STAY combine short- and long-term goals. Both groups differ in context. While STAY wants young couples to see the area’s elementary schools as a viable option, Clintonville Go Public says the community in recent years has begun to embrace

the neighborhood elementary schools—Clinton, Indian Springs and Colerain. [Disclosure: My two kids attend a Clintonville elementary school.] But persuading parents to consider Dominion Middle School and Whetstone High School will take more time and effort.

Part of that effort is marketing and rebranding—changing the community’s perception of a school. When Dahlberg first attended a Clintonville school fair years ago, he was disappointed by what he saw. “All the private schools and schools from outside the neighborhood had these slick brochures and pamphlets,” he says. “We’d get to Indian Springs and Clinton, and they were dittos. They had to have been made on a Xerox machine from 1978. So the district needs help selling itself. We are now in an age of school choice. If you want kids to stay, you’ve got to sell your program.”

Some of Go Public’s rebranding effort involves changing the accepted terminology. Dahlberg, for instance, hates the term “feeder,” so Go Public instead uses “pathway.” “‘Feeder’ sounds like you’re going to get chewed up and spit out,” he says. “‘Pathway’ says you’re following a path to college or a trade.”

STAY has focused much of its effort so far on Stewart Alternative Elementary, a German Village school that initially accepted students only through the Columbus City Schools lottery. In 2013, STAY petitioned and eventually won approval from the Columbus Education Commission to make Stewart a partial neighborhood school, albeit with smaller boundaries than STAY had hoped for. (Stewart’s new borders fall within German Village proper, and many of the STAY families live in Merion Village and Schumacher Place.) Flower and others have been promoting the school by giving tours to prospective families, and the group plans to assign a reading level to every book in the library so teachers can easily find the right books for each student.

At Nettelhorst in Chicago, many of the changes were outward. Common wisdom says if you change the culture of a school, the climate will change. But Edelberg and her partners were betting if they changed the climate, the culture would follow. Doors were painted, and local artists were recruited to create murals in the hallways. Last year Clintonville Go Public took a page from this play-book and raised more than \$18,000 by hosting a prom for grownups; that money was used to revamp the lobby of Dominion Middle School with new furniture and a mural. “It’s a simple thing, but it makes such a difference!” Dahlberg says. “Before, you walked in and didn’t know where you were going. Now it’s very clear that this is the waiting area. There’s a couch and chairs and a rug.”

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This fall Go Public hosted a Masquerade Ball; proceeds will go toward technology upgrades at Whetstone and Dominion, which doesn't have Wi-Fi access throughout the building. The group is also working with Dominion principal Dottie Flanagan to write grants for an after-school program.

In the neighborhood-school model, buy-in from the community—including local businesses and adults with no children or grown children—is important. But buy-in from the school principal is just as crucial. STAY has been working closely with Stewart principal Ebone Johnson. "She was excited about our desires and wanted us to be involved," Flower says. "Having a principal who was wanting the partnership and excited about it was huge." And Johnson says partnering with STAY has been every school's dream. "What they're trying to do will affect every child in our building," Johnson says. "Their approach is working. On any given day, we have between three and five parents or other members of the German Village community in our building."

Go Public similarly touts its partnerships with principals Janet Routzong at Whetstone and Flanagan at Dominion, along with the elementary school principals; in interviews, these school leaders echoed Go Public's enthusiasm and resolve.

Other similar-minded parent groups such as TEAM Berwick, Northwest STARS and Short North Parents have recently formed in other areas of the district. But all these groups face giant challenges, not the least of which is the damaged reputation of Columbus City Schools. Try as it may, the district is struggling to distance itself from the data-manipulation scandal that was brought to light by a *Columbus Dispatch* investigation. An 18-month investigation of the district by state auditor Dave Yost, completed in December 2013, confirmed what the reporters had found: The practice of falsifying records to improve students' test scores (and thereby the school's standing on the annual state report card) was widespread. In November 2013, nearly 70 percent of Columbus voters rejected a Columbus City Schools levy—its first defeat in 23 years—

signaling that the district had not yet earned back the trust of the city.

And it's not over. Just this summer, state investigators subpoenaed the records of eight current or former employees of Whetstone. Routzong was not principal at Whetstone during the 2010-11 school year, but she's still dealing with repercussions of the scandal. "My goal that first year—and it still is my goal—was to establish and rebuild the faith in leadership of Whetstone High School and Columbus City Schools," Routzong says.

The lengths to which former district employees went to ensure good grades on the Ohio Department of Education's annual report card underscores just how much weight everyone—the state, local schools, prospective and current parents—places on those ratings, which the state tweaked last year to mirror an old-fashioned grade card with marks of A through F in different areas. For instance, in the achievement category, Dominion received a C (79.5 percent) for its "performance index" but got an F (42.9 percent) for "indicators met" in 2013-14.

"Most often I hear about the report card," Dominion principal Flanagan says. "It's not a failing school, and people need to understand what the report card means before we decide whether or not a school is failing." One example Flanagan gives is the report card's measurement of how well a school closed the achievement gap among students regardless of income, race, ethnicity or disability. "We went from an 8 percent closure [in 2012-13] to a 68 percent closure, which is huge," she says. "But on the state report card that looks like a D. So we're doing everything right, but working in this new report card system and helping the public understand exactly what it means is a challenge we face every day."

"Test scores don't tell you everything about a school," Flower says, noting Stewart Alternative Elementary's most recent "D." For instance, in Ohio, third-grade students must now meet a minimum score on the state reading test to advance to fourth grade, and all but three third-graders at Stewart passed. "To me, that's really encouraging," Flower says.

The state report card is a measurable result, but many of the groups' efforts aren't measurable; a community's perception of a school is a nebulous thing until it isn't. "I won't see much of a difference while my kids are in school," admits Dahlberg, whose children attend Clinton Elementary. "Do you know how many minds we'd have to change in Whetstone's educational base to make that change in five years? It'll happen in increments, not in large chunks. I'm OK with that. You can't change something on this scale overnight. You do it one conversation at a time."

In September, Edelberg and former Nettelhorst principal Susan Kurland returned to Columbus to speak with a group of parents, educators and community leaders as part of the multi-day Great Placemakers Lab conference. During an evening Q&A session in the second-floor ballroom of the Westin Columbus, members of Go Public and STAY peppered the speakers with questions, discussing what the next steps should be for schools like Whetstone and Stewart.

"This is a huge opportunity for Stewart," Edelberg told the audience. "You can make it anything you want!"

After the presentation, I spoke to two Whetstone moms involved with Go Public; their passion was contagious as they trumpeted the school's academic rigor and extracurricular offerings. Mary Pajor has graduated two sons from Whetstone, and they both received college scholarships—one at the University of Alabama, the other at the University of South Carolina; her daughter is a junior at Whetstone this year. The mothers also heaped praise on principal Routzong and described the school as the best-kept secret in Clintonville, though their goal is for the positive aspects of the school to be more well-known. "It's such a great, vibrant school, but people don't realize that because they hear all the old negative stuff," Pajor says.

It was a persuasive sales pitch. By the end of the conversation, I could envision my own kids going to Whetstone. I also realized part of Go Public's campaign had already reached my family. Last year I brought my kindergartener to a Whetstone "Pathway Night" before a Friday evening football game. My son, his friends, his friends' parents and I made a tunnel on the field for the players to run through before the game. It was the first time I'd set foot on Whetstone's campus, and it was fun—even comforting. "Middle school and high school seem so scary. It's nice to see that these kids are just like your kids, and it's gonna be OK," Pajor says.

The neighborhood school movement isn't revolutionary. It's merely an avenue for parents and communities to get involved. "The act of engagement is the only thing that matters," Edelberg says. "We've all been sold this bill of goods that has told us that education isn't within our control. But if people knew they had the power to fix the school on their corner—that they don't have to wait for somebody to give it to them. They can get a group together that walks in and says, 'Hi, we are here to help. We want this school to sing, and we will assemble an army to make it happen. Give us your wish list, and let's make this happen.' It's actually doable."
