


# **Identifying Opportunities**



### **Small Schools**

# CCS has a significant number of small schools across school levels



Note: 350 student cutoff for small elementary schools is the approximate point at which a typical school goes from two strands to three strands per grade. 500 student cutoff for small MS and HS represents 125 students per grade in HS, which allows for 4-5 strands to afford departmentalization and electives.






State Comparison: Relative to State Peers, CCS also has higher spend on Facilities and Maintenance and Student Transportation.

**School Closures: Phase I** 



Broadleigh Elementary School (built 1952; FCI=95%)

#### **Final Proposal:**

Merge Broadleigh Elementary School with Eastgate, East Columbus and Fairmoor Elementary Schools.


This recommendation closes Broadleigh Elementary School and welcomes those students into the Eastgate, East Columbus, and Fairmoor school communities. This will make better use of all three buildings, with an expected 88.5% utilization.


#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**

- Provides services for English Language Learners
- Honor prior tax-payers investments

- Increase wrap around services for families
- Opportunity for more robust offerings
- Additional staff to provide services for ELL and students with special needs
- Families and students can access services closer to home







Fairwood (built 1924; FCI=111%) and Moler (built 1967; FCI=91%)

#### **Final Proposal:**

Combine Fairwood Elementary School with Ohio Avenue and Livingston Elementary Schools.


Combine Moler Elementary School with Lincoln Park and Livingston Elementary Schools.


This recommendation will make better use of all three elementary school buildings (Ohio Avenue, Livingston and Lincoln Park). With an expected 87.49% utilization.

#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**


• Minimize any transportation disruption

- Ohio Avenue, Livingston, and Lincoln Park ES are modernized learning environments
- Honor prior tax-payers investments by making complete utilization of these facilities









Lindbergh Elementary School (built 1958; FCI=67%)

#### **Final Proposal:**

Consolidate Lindbergh with Binns, Burroughs, and West Mound Elementary Schools.


This recommendation closes Lindbergh Elementary School and welcoming those students into the Binns, Burroughs and West Mound school communities will make better use of all three buildings, with an expected 83.8% utilization.

#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**

- Aging and under enrolled facility
- Binns, Burroughs, and West Mound Elementary Schools have all been renovated
- Maximizes the number of walkable schools

- Enhanced teaching and learning environment due to renovations
- Opportunity for more robust offerings
- Additional staff to provide services for ELL and students with special needs
- Families and students can access services closer to home







**West Broad Elementary School** 

(built 1914; FCI=89%)

#### **Final Proposal:**

Combine West Broad with Westgate, Highland, and Valleyview Elementary School.


This recommendation closes West Broad Elementary School and welcomes those students into the Westgate, Highland and Valleyview school communities. This will make better use of all three buildings, with an expected 87.9% utilization.


#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**

- Avoid overcrowding in remaining schools
- Keep one elementary school open north of Broad Street on a shared campus with Westmoor Middle School (Valleyview Elementary)
- Maximizes the number of walkable schools

- Opportunity for more robust offerings
- Additional staff to provide services for ELL and students with special needs
- Families and students can access services closer to home







North Linden Elementary School (built 1949; FCI=89%)

#### **Final Proposal:**

Consolidate North Linden with the neighboring elementary schools (Huy, Maize, Innins, and Northtowne).


This recommendation closes North Linden Elementary School and welcomes those students into the Huy, Maize, Innis and Northtowne school communities. This will make better use of all three buildings, with an expected 85.74% utilization.


#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**

- Closing all three schools would disproportionately impact English Language Learners (ELL)
- Limited options for moving students from Northtowne, if North Linden were to close
- Closing Innis would increase travel times for students in that neighborhood
- North Linden, built in 1949, is one of the district's oldest buildings
- Minimize the impact on walk and transportation times

- Increase wrap around services for families
- Opportunity for more robust offerings
- Additional staff to provide services for ELL and students with special needs

## Columbus City Preparatory School for Boys




#### **Final Proposal:**

Merge the Columbus City Preparatory School for Boys program into the Columbus City Preparatory School for Girls site.

This recommendation closes the current Columbus City Preparatory School for Boys site on Medway Avenue, welcoming those students into the Columbus City Preparatory School for Girls site with an expected 59% utilization.

- The CCPS Boys program is currently in a building that needs significant renovations
- There are only 82 students are enrolled at Columbus City Preparatory School for Boys







### Buckeye MS (built 1962; FCI=67%) and Marion-Franklin HS

#### **Final Proposal:**

Consolidate Buckeye Middle School and Marion-Franklin High School to create a 6-12 grade site with both a middle school and a high school on the same campus.

This recommendation will make better use of the building, with an expected 70% utilization.


#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**


- Avoids concerns about blending school communities
- Reduces the transportation impact

- Keeps the feeder pattern intact
- Builds upon prior proposals for the area
- Retains traditional high school and traditional middle school within the sites
- Opportunity for more robust offerings

# **Columbus Alternative High School**

(McGuffey Facility-built 1926; FCI = 98%)


#### **Final Proposal:**


Move Columbus Alternative High School programming into East High School and joining the East and CAHS communities. Ensure that the combined program's name acknowledges East High School's deep history in the Community.

This recommendation closes the McGuffey Building that currently houses the CAHS program and will now welcome those students into the East High School, with an expected 107.7% utilization.

#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**

- Support to move CAHS to a modern facility
- Aligns with CAHS academic and extracurricular opportunities for students
- Downtown High School lacks alignment with desired programming (gymnasium, theater).








# **Columbus Alternative High School**


(McGuffey Facility-built 1926; FCI = 98%) continued

#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**

- East students will not be displaced.
- Involve the East and CAHS communities in a multi-year planning for school expansion

- CAHS's current building was a former elementary school
- CAHS's current space is too small to accommodate the educational programs that students deserve
- Honor prior tax-payers investments by making complete utilization of the East High School
- The addition of CAHS students can be accommodated in the school
- Increase exposure to thriving arts program
- COTA access for students







## 270 E. State Street Administrative Building


**Final Proposal:** Relocate 270 E. State Street (Columbus Education Center) to 3700 S. High Administrative Building


This recommendation will make better use of the building, with the use of 300 SF/FTF at 3700 S. High. With this recommendation 270 E. State Street building would close.

#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**

 Desire to see Central Office (CEC) consolidate to 3700 S. High Street Administrative site

- Age of facility
- Ongoing maintenance expense

**Grade Band Standardization** 



#### **South HS**

**Final Proposal:** Consolidate the 6th grade students from the South feeder pattern area to South High School.

This recommendation, realigning the feeder patterns in the South attendance boundary and welcoming area sixth-grade students into South 6-12 will standardize the grade bands for middle and elementary school students, along with bringing the utilization rate of the facility to 96%.

#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**

• Reduces the transportation impact

#### **Rationale:**

- Keeps the feeder pattern intact
- Retains a traditional high school and a traditional middle school within the site
- Opportunity for more robust offerings

# Linden-McKinley STEM Academy 7-12

**Final Proposal**: Consolidate the 6th-grade students from the Linden-McKinley STEM Academy boundary area and establish a middle and high school at the site


This recommendation realigns the feeder patterns in the Linden attendance boundary and welcoming the area sixth-grade students into Linden-McKinley 6-12 will standardize the grade bands for elementary and middle school students, along with bringing the utilization rate of the facility to 93%

#### Rationale:

- Retain a traditional high school and middle school on site
- Opportunity for more robust offerings

#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**

- Adding 6th grade to LMSA maintains the current feeder pattern, improves building utilization, and reduces transportation impact.
- This plan standardizes grade bands with a traditional high school and middle school at the site. It aligns with P/K-5 standardization in the LMSA boundary area, consistent with South and Marion-Franklin.
- 6th-grade students would benefit from a traditional middle school experience, including more electives and increased instructional time.






# Starling Pre-K-8

**Final Proposal**: Standardize the grade levels for this community's schools by transitioning Starling into a Pre-K-5 site and transferring the middle school students to Westmoor and Hilltonia Middle Schools.

#### **Revised Plan Incorporates Community Feedback:**

- Starling Middle School students can better be served by the neighboring middle schools (Westmoor and Hilltonia)
- This would provide the middle school students from Starling with the opportunity to access more electives and extracurricular activities
- This would also provide more instructional time for the middle school students from Starling as they are currently on an elementary school schedule, which does not give them equitable learning time in comparison to their peers in neighboring middle schools





Continue to explore options to move CGA from its current location and look for other alternatives for the placement of Columbus Gifted Academy.


## **Duxberry Park Arts Impact School**



Develop a plan to move Duxberry to the Fort Hayes campus. Although the move will provide the K-12 Arts Pathway, the District needs to further investigate the current facilities on the Fort Hayes campus.

# **Additional Considerations**



#### Additional Considerations from the Task Force

- Encouraging the Board to work directly with the community on a plan for current and future buildings that are closed or vacant.
- Developing an annual public report on capital planning which aligns facility master planning, school closures, major renovations and long-term facility planning work, and Board policies tied to each.
- Clearly identifying program model shifts that move student supports to schools closer to home.
- Continuing to explore opportunities for shared spaces for schools and community partners (e.g. athletic facilities, parks and recreation).

#### Glossary of Key Terms

- **Utilization** The measure of how effectively a school uses its available space, calculated by dividing current enrollment by total capacity and expressed as a percentage.
- **Capacity** The maximum number of students a school facility can effectively accommodate, determined by available teaching stations, student-to-teacher ratios, and specific space requirements for programs like music, art, special education, and English language learners.
- Facility Condition Index (FCI) A measure of a facility's condition expressed as a percentage representing the cost of repairing a facility to like-new condition, divided by the costs of new construction for an identical facility. Once the cost of those repairs exceed 2/3 of the cost of new construction, a particular facility would normally be recommended for replacement.
- **Legacy Building** Buildings that have not been renovated or re-built during the Facility Master Plan
