IMPORTANT FAMILY SURVEY ON REOPENING OF SCHOOL:

Columbus City Schools' newly-formed Reopening Task Force is planning for how CCS may welcome back students and staff to open the 2020-2021 school year. An important component of that effort is hearing directly from our families.

The District has put together a brief 13-question survey for families to provide feedback on students returning to school this fall. It asks about online learning, access to technology, transportation and child care needs, and health concerns.

This School Reopening Family Survey was sent to families directly through phone and email.

PHASED IN APPROACH TO RESTORING STUDENT ATHLETICS:

Knowing the desire of many of our scholar athletes to return to the playing field, Columbus City Schools will permit its high school interscholastic athletic teams to resume workouts and team activities beginning July 1.

Teams will follow a phased-in approach that specifies health and safety guidelines and protocols for social distancing, hygiene, and sanitizing. Some of the initial protocols include:

- Pre-workout self-screenings for coaches and student-athletes. Those who are feeling ill
 or showing symptoms will not be permitted to participate in activities.
- A limit to the number of people at a time during an activity, and a minimum of six feet between each individual must be maintained at all times.
- All coaches must wear face masks during any activity.

- Every school will have a standard daily practice schedule that permits 90 minutes for an activity followed by cleaning and sanitizing before the next group or team begins.
- Individual drills requiring the use of athletic equipment is permissible, but the equipment must be cleaned between use.
- Water stations will not be permitted and not in use. All students will bring their own water bottles, and water bottles may not be shared.
- Shirts and shoes must be worn at all times.
- Indoor areas such as weight rooms will have 6-feet social distancing markings.

The plan will allow for the safe integration of more participants in team activities in mid-July, as most of the social distancing guidelines and health protocols remain in place.

Student athletes should reach out to their coaches to learn more about the plans and for a schedule of workouts and activities.

Our Community-wide Celebration of the Columbus City Schools Class of 2020 is going strong, with yard signs, electronic billboards, and radio commercials echoing the student-powered message: "Can't Stop Us!"

Listen for our Senior Celebration messages airing on the local iHeart Radio and Radio One stations, including Power 107.5, Magic 95.5, Joy 107.1, 97.9 WNCI, 92.3 WCOL, Throwback 105.3 and 106.7 The Beat.

Large electronic billboards located in high-visibility areas throughout the city also carry the celebratory message, along with hundreds of yard signs placed at students' homes.

The "Can't Stop Us!" theme of this celebration came out of input from several seniors who said they wanted a message that reflected on how this special graduating class didn't let the COVID-19 crisis prevent them from achieving success.

CONTINUED ACCESS TO FOOD DURING THE SUMMER:

As a reminder, Columbus City Schools' 15 Grab-and-Go Food Sites remain open. Each weekday, students and parents can pick up free breakfasts and lunches for any children 18 years old and under.

At the Community Tables at each site, our partners at Children's Hunger Alliance offer additional take-home meals and several of our community partners are providing additional resources, such as hygiene kits, art activities, and academic materials.

P-EBT CARDS COMING TO HOMES

As a reminder, all K-12 students registered in Columbus City Schools are eligible for the federal Pandemic-Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) program, which provides school-age children with Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly known as food stamps) benefits.

All of our K-12 families are eligible for this benefit, even if they have never received food assistance in the past.

According to our partners at the Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services, CCS families will start receiving the P-EBT cards in the mail in mid-June. Families who already receive SNAP will see the new benefits funds added to their existing EBT/Ohio Direction Card.

Our partners at the Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services also want to remind families about the new Rental Assistance Program to provide relief for eligible families who are struggling to meet rent or facing eviction.

FREE COVID-19 TESTING FROM COLUMBUS PUBLIC HEALTH:

Our partners at Columbus Public Health are now offering free, drive-thru COVID-19 testing in partnership with Mount Carmel, Ohio Health and The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center.

Anyone in the community with symptoms can now get a free test, Monday through Friday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., at Columbus Public Health (240 Parsons Ave.).

If you're sick, it's important to get a test as soon as possible to protect yourself, your loved ones and the community. Here's what else you need to do know about COVID-19 testing at Columbus Public Health:

- You don't need health insurance to get a free test.
- You don't need a doctor's referral, but appointments are recommended by calling 614-645-1519 to register for drive-thru or walk-up testing.
- The test is a nasal swab that will be administered by a trained technician. It won't hurt, but it might be uncomfortable.

If you test positive for COVID-19, a public health employee will call you and ask questions about where you have been and who you have been in close contact with. This is called contact tracing, and the information gathered is only used to contact potential cases so they can be quarantined to help prevent the spread of COVID-19.

In addition to Columbus Public Health, nine other community sites throughout Columbus are also offering free COVID-19 testing. You can find a list of test sites by visiting www.columbus.gov/coronavirus.

MORE OPPORTUNITIES TO FIND CHILD CARE:

As child care providers begin to reopen and parents seek out care so they can return to work, our partners at Future Ready Columbus are helping to expand opportunities for more families to find classrooms.

With support from the Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services, eight local child care centers are adding classrooms for infants, toddlers and preschool-aged children as part of the Publicly Funded Child Care program. The grant recipients are:
