- 3. Bring your Field Notes pages to your arts classes the first day of school. Be prepared to write a short response and participate in discussions about your live art experiences.

ATTACH A SEPARATE SHEET TO ANSWER THE FOLLOWING

- **1. Describe:** What do you see, hear, or notice right away? What is happening in the piece? What elements stand out (movement/structure/color/sound/space/shape/line/energy? What is the setting/style/structure? Are there clear characters/themes/moods? FOCUS on facts. What can be described without opinion?
- **2. Analyze** How are the elements organized or designed? How do the parts of the work relate to one another? (e.g., movement phrases, use of space, body levels, composition) What tools or principles did the artist use—repetition, contrast, symmetry, rhythm, texture, timing? How does the use of space, time, or structure shape the piece? What choices feel deliberate?
- **3. Interpret** What does this work mean? What feelings or ideas does it express? What do you think the artist is trying to communicate or explore? What emotions, stories, or metaphors come up for you? Does it connect to any personal, social, or cultural themes?
- **4. Evaluate** What is your personal response? What worked well in this piece, and why? Was there anything that felt unclear, awkward, or unresolved? How did the piece make you feel—engaged, moved, curious, confused? Would you recommend this work to someone else? Why or why not?
