

College Visits & College Rep Visits

- Read Announcements/Updates we send out
- Visit when school is in session & allow enough time to get the feel
- · Talk with faculty and students
- Talk to College Reps during visits to WHS & College Fairs
 - 28 colleges visited WHS in Fall 2019 → sign up using Naviance!

Creating Your College List

- •Apply to at least four colleges.
- •Make sure you include "reach, good-fit and safety schools"
- Affordability?
- •Seek advice from trusted adults, com match activities, and do your research (don't just rely on friends)

ACTION STEP:

Sign up for at least two College Rep visits in the Fall

Creating Your College List



- **Reach Schools:** Student may fall within the academic profile of the college, but the admit rate is very low; OR student's academic profile may be below the college's averages for their admitted students
- **Good-Fit:** Student falls within the academic profile of the college's admitted students and the admit rate of the college is not highly selective
- Safety Schools: Student exceeds the academic profile of the college's admitted students and the college is not highly selective, or is open enrollment

The Application

What's Important to Colleges?

- ☐ Challenging courses (transcript)
- □ GPA
- ☐ Admissions Tests (SAT, ACT, SAT Subject Tests)
- ☐ Meaningful extracurricular activities, community service, work experiences
- ☐ Essay(s) & Short Answers
- ☐ Recommendations Teachers and School Counselor
- ☐ Development
- ☐ Music/Art

Your Academic Performance

- ★ ALL of your grades matter!
- ★ Finish your Junior year strong
- ★ Take/retake courses this summer if necessary
- ★ Colleges will review your Senior schedule and grades during the application review process.
 - Keep taking advanced, AP and/or CCP courses especially in math, science & foreign language
 - Don't just sign up for the minimum graduation requirements

SAT or ACT?



- Take **both** tests! Most colleges will consider your highest score(s) from either test.
- Compare your scores after junior year and focus on preparing to retake your best test one-two more times senior year.
- Why retest? A few schools use superscoring (combine best sub-scores).
- Test fee waivers for students who qualify as economically disadvantaged*
- Test optional colleges (http://www.fairtest.org/)

SAT Subject Tests

- One hour/multiple choice test on one of 20 different subjects.
- Required/Recommended by *some selective* colleges and programs for admission.
- Some colleges accept the ACT instead of the SAT Reasoning + Subject Tests
- Opportunity to provide additional standardized testing results

Plan Ahead... 2019-2020 Test Dates

SAT May 4, 2019 June 1, 2019 August 24, 2019 *October 5, 2019 November 2, 2019 December 7, 2019 March 14, 2020



Plan to complete at least one SAT and/or one ACT Junior Year! Registration <u>deadlines are 5 weeks before tests</u>-register early!

These are the last test dates that meet November 1 deadlines (scholarships)!

→ ACTION STEP:

Talk with School Counselor/IKIC about testing plan Send existing ACT/SAT Scores to Colleges (see next slide)

Meaningful Extracurricular Activities & Experiences

- Passionate involvement in a few activities, demonstrating leadership and initiative
- Community service
- Work or out-of-school experiences (including summer) that illustrate responsibility, dedication, and development of areas of interest
- That Extra "Something"
- Plan for a productive summer!

Common App vs. Institutional App

Reporting Your Scores

- Send all scores- Most colleges will use your best scores from one test administration date; a few will use super-scoring; some require a complete test history
- Many colleges require that you send scores directly from ACT/SAT, not on a school transcript
- Score Choice gives option to send ACT and SAT scores by test date, and SAT Subject Test scores by individual test.
- You are Responsible for Sending Test Scores: If you wait to send scores to colleges until applying senior year, make sure to send score reports at least 2 weeks before deadlines!

- Common Black College App 58 HBCUs on 1 application commonblackcollegeapp.com

- · You pay fee when submit applications OR
- · Use Application fee waivers if qualify
- IKIC application payments (3 applications)
- Free application offers
- Common Black College App: \$35 one time

2019-2020 Common Application Essay Prompts


- 1. Some students have a background, identity, 5. Discuss an accomplishment, event, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story
- 2. The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the
- 3. Reflect on a time when you questioned or challenged a belief or idea. What prompted your thinking? What was the outcome?
- 4. Describe a problem you've solved or a problem you'd like to solve. It can be an intellectual challenge, a research query, an ethical dilemma - anything that is of personal importance, no matter the scale. Explain its significance to you and what steps you took or could be taken to identify a solution.

- or realization that sparked a period of personal growth and a new understanding of yourself or others.
- 6. Describe a topic, idea, or concept you find so engaging that it makes you lose all track of time. Why does it captivate you? What or who do you turn to when you want to learn more?
- 7. Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.

→ <u>ACTION STEP:</u>

Write a good draft of Common App Essay by August!

Essays must be 250-650 words

FREE Application for Federal Student Aid

Class of 2020

- file AFTER October 1, 2019
- use 2018 tax information
- FAFSA.ed.gov (2019-2020 School Year!)

What will you need:

- 2018 Tax Return
- Social Security Number (Student & Parents)
- · Parent FSA ID (if already created)






